Yale School of Medicine **Seeking Study Participants**

The Yale Child Study Center is seeking participants for a study that may be of interest to some of our families. They are specifically looking for students between the ages of 12-19 who have autism spectrum disorder to participate in a treatment study of comprehensive therapy for irritability in autism. (CTIA). The Study provides a comprehensive assessment of autism and therapy for irritability at no cost to the families. Families also receive up to \$250 for participation. Inclusion criteria: students ages 12-19 who have autism spectrum disorder complicated by disruptive behaviors and who are capable of completing study procedures, including filling out questionnaires, participating in verbal therapy, and answering questions about symptoms and behaviors before and after treatment. autism and disruptive behavior? Comprehensive Therapy for Irritability in Teenagers with Autism Study If you have a child who is 12 to 19 years old, has been diagnosed with autism spectrum disorder (ASD),

and has significant levels of irritability and disruptive behavior, they may be eligible to participate in a free and confidential study. The study includes free assessment of autism at the Yale Child Study Center and up to 15 weekly sessions of therapy. Compensation of up to \$250 for completion of the study.

Student Innovation Sparks Virtual Reality Initiative at BBA

At Ben Bronz Academy, we take pride in seeing our students take the initiative to enhance not only their education but also the learning experiences of their peers. One of our students, Dylan, recently sparked an exciting new idea for our Maker Space by advocating for integrating Virtual Reality (VR) technology into our Library Media Center.



Dylan presented a well-researched and thoughtful proposal to the administration, demonstrating how VR could revolutionize learning by engaging students in subjects they might otherwise find less appealing. He emphasized VR's immersive and interactive nature, which opens up unique opportunities to make learning more dynamic and accessible.

In his proposal, Dylan shared that VR would benefit students by catering to their preference for hands-on learning. He noted, "At this school, students prefer hands-on stuff and would likely really like this Virtual Reality." He also pointed out that VR offers greater control over learning experiences, such as allowing students to manipulate the size of virtual objects, making the content more engaging and personalized.

Dylan didn't overlook potential challenges, either. He addressed concerns about the risk of overuse or discomfort, like nausea. He suggested practical solutions, such as setting time limits for younger students and gradually increasing the duration as they progress through the grades.

The administration is grateful to Dylan for his thoughtful and balanced proposal. Thanks to his research and vision, BBA is now actively seeking donations or leads to acquire VR sets to bring this project to life. We welcome any support in helping Dylan make this innovative vision a reality!

Ben Bronz Academy celebrates its 40th anniversary helping students who have struggled to learn

Ben Bronz Academy is celebrating its 40th anniversary in 2025, Ben Bronz is a state-approved private special education school in West Hartford servicing students grades 2-12 from around the state who struggle to learn.

The students have been

identified with various learning challenges, including:
Dyslexia, Dysgraphia, Dyscalculia, Executive Function
Difficulties, ADHD, CAPD, and ASD (mild/Asperger's).

The school's goal is to help students correct their functional weaknesses and to develop strong, spontaneous thinking habits that build self-confidence, foster curiosity and an enthusiasm for learning. BBA was founded in 1985 with the belief that every student deserves to succeed. Since then, BBA has prepared more than 600 students for academic

success. BBA's individualized learning program enables students to master learning skills, achieve academic success and enhance self-confidence.

BBA has hundreds of success stories of students returning to their district schools and transitioning to traditional private schools of their choosing. Former students have Bachelor's, Masters and other advanced degrees, served in the military and work in skilled trades.

"Ben Bronz Academy has been a gift to our son's academic development, and we are grateful," said former BBA parents Dava and Brett Siedman. "Our child has jumped multiple grade levels in just a year and a half of time." Ben Bronz built self-confidence with academic success, the Siedmans said. "He transitioned from not really caring about his grades to being proud of his grades, as well as himself."

Ben Bronz is a day school with 59 students as of September coming from 32 towns throughout Connecticut and Southern Massachusetts. BBA also offers summer sessions for students who attend during the school year and as a targeted boost for those who attend other schools.
